FOOTBALL MATCH REPORTS

HAWKESBURY 1 OLD SODBURY 1.

FIRST HALF: The team started well, holding off Old Sodbury's breaks and making many of their own. Hugo made some good saves at the back, while upfront, Rory was very successful. It wasn't long before we pocketed a goal in the bottom corner.

SECOND HALF: Unfortunately, the 2nd half didn't go so well. Quite early on, Old Sodbury scored a goal but it could have been worse: goalkeeper Hugo stopped at least 10 so it wasn't a complete fail!

HAWKESBURY 4 IRON ACTON 1

Our team faced Iron Acton in the second game of the afternoon. The first goal was scored 5 minutes into the half and the second was scored about 1 minute later. Hugo made some amazing saves and the whole team did extremely well.

William scored in the second half about 13 minutes in and we scored one final goal just before the end of the match, making the overall score an impressive 4-1 to Hawkesbury.

Hawkesbury and Inglestone Commons Officer

I have been joined by a new colleague Matthew Lipton who will be dealing with enforcement issues and breaches of the Byelaws on the Commons. Matthew can be contacted directly by phone 01454 868925 or by e-mail:

Matthew.Lipton@southglos.gov.uk . In February, a resident of Hareley Common found half a bucket load of bright pink pellets dumped in the grass. A sample was collected by Environmental Health and the remainder removed by our street cleaning team. Heavy rain meant that some pellets disintegrated and were left behind and I am grateful to the local resident who covered these with soil and notified me. We don't know what the pellets were, but believe they may have been rat poison, of obvious concern to wildlife

and dog owners alike. Needless to say this is illegal and we are grateful to local residents for their swift action. Please do get in touch with either myself of Matthew if you see anything of concern. Hareley Common is in a designated Nitrate Vulnerable Zone (NVZ) and as part of our Higher Level Stewardship scheme, we calculate and record the amount of nitrogen deposited each year in the form of cow pats with the pat size and nitrogen content determined by the type and age of cattle. I kid you not. This is relatively simple for us and will be completed soon, but spare a thought for farmers who have to do this on a field by field basis. NVZs have a very real purpose and prevent water pollution through excessive nitrogen run off into ditches and streams.

Projects completed in February include clearance of brambles on Inglestone Common, clearance of a footpath exiting Hawkesbury Common through dense scrub and a coppice plot on Inglestone Common.

As the commons come into spring, tree and scrub works stop to favour nesting birds. The ponds warm up and pond life increases including the rare tassel stonewort which looks like a tangled fishing net under the water. Inglestone Common is one of its national strongholds and we are holding a short training course on Tuesday 28th March to look for it. Look out for posters for details.



Work is progressing well at Horton Court - we have started stripping back the layers of wallpaper and paint from the walls. Some of the modern partitions have been removed to improve the circulation on the first floor. Cupboards have been opened up to reveal openings hundreds of years old. Redundant pipework and cabling is being removed and new installed hidden under floors and behind panelling wherever possible. We have discovered cigarette packets

from the 1960's, newspapers from the 1980's and several signatures - one behind the panelling dating to 1927.

Scaffolding has started to go up to enable us to carry out repairs to the roofs, dormer windows and to repoint the stonework. Work to remove the 1920's bathrooms to the internal courtyard should begin in April after the bats have left their hibernation and before they start roosting.

The house feels so different already -

lighter and brighter and more welcoming - I have to say it is still absolutely freezing inside with no heating!

We have had an archaeologist carrying out a 'watching brief' during excavations - so far we have found the remains of a medieval dump to the rear of the house and the possible location of the kitchen to the Norman Hall near the Stable block in the garden.

We are still on programme to complete the house by next Spring.

A word of caution to begin with

Very soon the garden centres are going to be overflowing with dazzling displays of bedding plants for summer planting. As we could have frosts until mid-May many of these varieties are frostsensitive, and would not last.Even if one has the facility of a greenhouse, plants bought now and kept inside would likely become "leggy" and not in good order come planting time It's worth remembering that if one did lose plants the garden centres would only be happy to sell you them again

Planting onions and shallots

This month is a good time for planting these staples for the veg. garden. If sets are to be used it's worthwhile cutting off the wispy bits on the tops of the set and starting the set off in modules and planting out when the green shoots show. Birds will pull up the set by the remaining stem from last year (the wispy bit) but leave green shoots alone

<u>Garlic</u>

It's getting late for planting garlic, but there's still a couple of weeks left for the

job. Don't be tempted to use a bulb from the supermarket shelf as these may have been grown anywhere in the world and will just not suit our conditions.

as those from the garden centre would, It should be remembered that a clove of garlic is planted about 3 cms. under the surface of the soil rather than on top like the onions and shallots.

<u>Dahlias</u>

If we are to have a good show of these flowers we need to think about where we start.

Heat

If there is no heated area available, the only option is to plant tubers about mid-April so that the top of the tuber is about 10cms. under the soil. As the plant starts to shoot allow only the best and strongest shoot to remain cutting off the rest at ground level. This should ensure that the tuber's strength is all pushed into that stem.

Heated greenhouse

There are in essence two ways of propagating the tuber which should give good results.

By division

Pot up the tuber in a box or pots so that the compost you add comes up to the bottom of last years stem, and place somewhere light and warm and wait until the tuber starts to shoot When buds become obvious, cut down through the tuber until each section has a bud, a piece of the centre core, and apiece of the base which holds water.Pot up these sections and when the buds have grown into shoots plant as for tubers

Cuttings

Follow the same procedure as above but allow the shoots to grow to 6 to12 cms. and gut off below a leaf joint at 45 degrees on the base. Dip the shoots into hormone rooting powder and plant 4 or 5 around the edge of a 4 inch pot .Place somewhere warm and light (ideally a propagator) and the cuttings should take about 3 to 4weeks to root. If you give the cutting a gentle tug and it holds it's rooted. always keep the cuttings moist





South Gloucestershire Councillor's Report

Planning has become a very hot issue locally – Hawkesbury Upton is beginning to feel the pressures which other villages are facing because of the need for houses and the encouragement of economic growth.

The village has benefitted from two affordable housing developments over the last 20 years. Both these projects ensured that social housing was developed for local people, with a mixture of houses to rent and three houses under shared ownership. There is a very low turnover on these properties, with quite a list when one becomes vacant. The last shared ownership did not attract any local purchasers and had to be advertised wider.

It might be worth repeating the definition of Affordable Housing as used in the Core Strategy and the current NPPF:

- Affordable housing is social rented, affordable rented and intermediate housing provided to eligible households whose needs are not met by the market.
- Affordable housing is generally subsidised by the development as a planning requirement, so that it is provided at below market rent levels.
- In order to be considered as affordable for planning purposes it should include provisions to remain at an affordable price for future eligible households or for the

subsidy to be recycled for alternative affordable housing provision. It may include shared ownership and homes for sale at below market levels, but not housing which does not meet the above definition of affordable housing particularly in respect of its future retention as affordable housing and its restriction to eligible households.

Another part of the affordable housing policy refers to exception sites and where development can take place outside the settlement area and with the support of a Housing Needs Survey to fulfil a local need

Planning Policy asks for 35% of affordable housing on areas of 10 or more houses in urban areas and 5 houses in rural areas.

Houses in and around the village are generally more expensive than some other areas; we are in the Cotswolds; have great local schools and services, as well as being a vibrant village, all of which make it a great place to live.

The most recent planning policy consultation asked us to consider the services in the settlement in a Sustainable Access Profile. It will go on to help identify areas of development for the future. I have asked that parishes, especially the smaller parishes, be supported to address some of the challenges we all face and to help us all feel we can participate in shaping our communities. Speeding through the Village – At the time of going to press - the 20mph through the village should have been introduced. Over the past few weeks, I have received comments from resident's regarding difficulties accessing their properties on the High Street as a consequence of increased in on road parking. People are aware that car parking on Back Street is already causing a few difficulties. Short of building a car park – there is no solution apart from asking people to park considerately and use their own drives and garages for parking where possible.

Don't be alarmed if you have a **sticker on your waste bin** – the Council are encouraging us all to recycle more before the introduction of the smaller black bin. Hawkesbury folk are quite good at recycling however we will all need to do more in the future.

We do now have a **West of England Combined Authority - WECA** for short, It came into place on the 9th February and has its first meeting on the 1st March. Elections for the WECA Mayor will take place on the 4th May.

Neighbourhood Watch — March 2017

There were a number of socalled "Creeper" burglaries in the South Glos' region recently. These occur where offenders try the door handles of UPVC doors to see if they have been locked properly. If they haven't, the doors can be opened using a small screwdriver. Simply raising the door handle does NOT properly lock the door as the locking points do not engage. Always use a key to lock the door, then remove it and put it out of reach, but somewhere you can get to it in case of emergency

Be aware there have been reports of "**Nottingham Knockers**" in the area. These are groups of people who call at the door, often claiming to be ex-offenders "trying to go straight", selling overpriced, poor quality cleaning products. They can be very persuasive and often intimidating in getting people to hand over money, and will target elderly or vulnerable people.

The Police recommend that residents are wary when answering the door to people they don't know. Always engage a door chain before opening the door, and ensure that any other entrance to your home is secure before you do so. **Pedlars** are supposed to show a **Pedlars Certificate** that has been issued by the Police, but please don't always assume that what they show is genuine.

Please Note;

We are continuing to ask people for information on any other types of *rogue traders*, especially those that put *leaflets* through the door offering gardening or repair services, tarmacking or driveway repairs. Please send these leaflets to your Neighbourhood Watch Administrator at Concorde House or inform your local NHW Coordinator. Any other information you can provide would also be helpful, such as the date and time it was delivered, a description of the callers and details of any vehicle used. If someone in your area is actually using such a service, please let us know immediately

so we can check they are a genuine tradesperson.

If you have any information regarding an incident, please contact the Police on 101.

Tassimo pods recycling

Many thanks to those of you who continue to pass on your used Tassimo pods and plastic wrappings to me. I am quite used to finding plastic bags of these items left in my porch and am happy to continue to collect them. Rather than go to landfill, they can be recycled – our nearest recycling point is in Falfield – and it is very easy for me to drop the bags off whenever I travel up the M5. Karen, who is the local co-ordinator there, regularly sends off packages of Tassimo recycling, earning her 'Tassimo points', which can be converted into charitable donations. Since being involved in this scheme she has recycled 51,772 units (used pods) which is more than 839kg of waste which would have gone to landfill. This has allowed her to donate over £560 to Myeloma UK charity.

Thank you to all of you who continue to support this scheme and if anyone else would like to pass on their used Tassimo pods and plastic wrappings to me, just save leave them in the porch at 'Coombe View', High Street – next to the village hall.

PLEASE NOTE: Only Tassimo pods can be recycled in this scheme – please do not include other makes of pod, which will contaminate the collection and risk the whole lot being

rejected.

Nespresso pods recycling

- Place used Nespresso pods in a recycling bag and return to any Nespresso boutique – there is one in The Mall at Cribbs Causeway
- 2. Place used pods in a bag. Stick a Collect+ recycling label to the outside of the bag and drop off at any of the 5,900 local stores offering the Collect+ service (Collect+ labels are available free of charge from Nespresso boutiques or can be generated online at <u>collectplus.co.uk/nespresso-recycling</u> following the online instructions) Find your nearest Collect+ store at <u>www.collectplus.co.uk</u> or by downloading the Collect+ app. The nearest collection points are - Chipping Sodbury, Yate, Tetbury, Dursley or Thornbury

Hawkesbury Upton Hospital Hall - Chairman's Year End Report - February

Another busy year in the Hall, not only for social events but also the continued support from the regular users: Toddlers, Pre-school, Hawkesbury School of Dance, Karate, Youth Club, Badminton, Guides and Buffs. This year has seen frog racing, the glitter of the Ball and it's always fun trying to guess who is under the wig or inside a costume at the fancy dress party! The broad list of organisations confirms that the Hall users are promoting the key objectives of the original Trust Deed which are physical and mental training together with recreational, social, moral and intellectual development.

Therefore, many thanks for another year's support from all our Management Committee members who working together ensure that the Hall is maintained to a standard that ensures it is fit for purpose and meets all the current Regulations.

The Drama Group, Friends of St Marys, the Hawkesbury Show, the PTA, Cricket Club, the Bonfire event and many more private users have all contributed to the Hall's turnover and this year we have retained a surplus of just over £13,000, however, there was a deficit of nearly £4000 between income and expenditure with the shortfall being made up by grant funding. Although we can use some of this surplus for the necessary maintenance work mentioned below it doesn't take a mathematician to realise that there is a significant shortfall if we are to complete the work in the next 12 months. The positive aspect is that once those works have been completed then it will be some years before we need to have such significant expenditure, but there always seem to be another job around the corner.

Following on from the successful development of the kitchen our ongoing projects have not been quite as impressive or obvious, but still essential.

We have an ongoing programme of upgrading the electric supply and fittings, with costs in the region of £4000 to be spent over the next 12 months. Work has also started on the upstairs meeting room and the decoration has virtually been completed, but there will also be new lighting and ceiling tiles, together with new blinds and flooring so that this will be a more inviting and sociable space to meet the need of the variety of users. We were lucky to be offered, by Horton Village Hall, 20 matching comfortable chairs that had previously been used by the Cadbury's social club and were in good condition.

We are continuing with the external maintenance of the Hall, the main areas for the coming year are the replacement of windows and doors and resurfacing the car park. The intention is to replace the doors and windows with brown PVC, but this may have to be phased as the costs exceed £10,000. Our biggest issue is the car park, which was patched a few years ago, however, the areas in between the patches are now wearing badly. A quote to resurface the whole car park at £22,000 is going to pose a real challenge to raise sufficient funds so we are looking at options of repair. Although Kate Bashford and Jane Stanbridge have been doing an excellent job in getting grants for some of our other developments, pure maintenance is not seen as an item that attracts support unless we can show measures such as improvements in energy efficiency. We posted a voluntary contribution box for users of the car park in the hope that funds from this would build a sinking fund for car park repairs. However, this rarely produces much more than £10 - 15 per month and last month it was £2.95, so it would take some time to achieve our target if we relied on the users. We do need to work on those who park in the car park to seek more contributions.

The Drama group have put in a new sound system and are proposing some more works to enhance the stage experience.

Although we can appeal for more users of the Hall, there are not that many occasions when it is actually available, so a key role especially of our treasurer is balancing the cashflow to allow for the maintenance expenditure against income. We would of course welcome a benefactor or benefactors who would like to contribute to the Hall Charity to help us whether as part of their Corporate Social Responsibility programme or as a gesture of community support. So if anyone works for an organisation who contributes to such projects then please let me know.

We are also looking for volunteers to work on the event side of the Hall to liaise with existing users and see if there are opportunities to hold more events for the benefit of the community.

We have undertaken a number of more minor but important projects which take time and effort from our small but energetic working group who undertake maintenance jobs in and around the Hall so a big thank you to those for their contribution over the last 12 months. Projects have included items such as replacing the sign for the Skateboard park; the previous one having been vandalised, much needed to comply with insurance requirements. Other tasks include work by Angelo Sauro and Neil Fozard cleaning and then sealing the floor to one of the under stage cupboards; essential to prevent damage to the Hall floor. Similarly Barry Hope provided two trolleys for the small tables as previously moving the tables was damaging them and the Hall floor.

I have made a general mention for the support from the committee and a few others specifically, but we must not forget our Secretary, Fiona Steeds; Treasurer, Bill Cullen; Booking Secretary, Lorraine Rutter and for the additional support that Louise Roberts gives over and above her role in cleaning the Hall.

I believe that the Hall is in a reasonable financial position and with careful management and continued support we can maintain it as the focal centre for the community.

SODBURY FUEL



There is an article in last month's New Scientist (4th February 2017) about the dangers of wood burners.

I am in no way taking a moralistic stance here, for I myself burn wood, but I would like to bring attention to some of the points made by leading experts in atmospheric pollution.

Air pollution in London rose to heights this year not seen since 2011, and it is thought that woodburning stoves contributed 50%. Recent findings suggest they pose a serious threat to the health of owners and are also accelerating climate change. In the U.K., wood burning is officially the single biggest source of an especially nasty form of air pollution.

Burning wood produces small particles similar to those found in cigarette smoke and diesel engine exhausts (referred to as PM _{2.5} particulates), which get into the blood and brain, increasing the risk of many disorders including heart disease. Children are especially vulnerable.

In the UK, residential wood burning could undo our other efforts to control air pollution. People are exposed to high levels of traffic pollution when travelling along busy streets, but wood burners produce large amounts of pollution in the home. Studies in Copenhagen have shown that particulate levels inside homes with modern log burners are several times higher than the highest ever recorded outdoors.

If you have a wood burning stove, here's how to minimise the effects:

- Don't burn scrap wood. Treated wood can release toxic substances such as arsenic.
- 2. Burn wood whose moisture content is about 20%.
- 3. Avoid having fires when the air is still. This can create a pool of polluted air over the village.


