





Decades of research has made it possible to live with diabetes, provided you submit to constant and costly medical intervention, including multiple daily injections or the use of an infusion pump 24/7, plus half a dozen or more blood tests every single day. The next ambition of researchers is to make it possible for Gordon and Laura and millions like them to live without it. At present, there is no cure.

So, with my resolve strengthening as the daylight hours are lengthening, I've signed on the dotted line for the 10K charity run. I just wish I had a Chinese bank account. Because then, when I write the deposit cheque, I could take enormous pleasure in dating it for the first day of the Chinese New Year: Rabbits Rabbits Rabbits / Rabbit.

At our January meeting, Guide Dogs for the Blind speaker Verna Clifford, who is also a member of Chipping Sodbury WI gave a full and interesting talk on living with sight impairment. She brought along her dog Cody and stressed the importance of a guide dog in helping its owner keep their independence.

This year the organization celebrates its 80th year and we were given an in-depth talk on all the work involved in training a guide dog. Puppy walkers do a wonderful job in socializing a dog, then

at one year old they are given to a trainer who introduces them to harness and pavement skills. The dog then goes to a mobility instructor who identifies what sort of dog it is and matches it with a suitable owner. Verna said Cody works quite quickly, like her.

Verna also makes good use of the many gadgets available, such at tactile rulers, talking scales and her beloved organizer with which she would not be without! However many gadgets she said use speech packages with lots of memory and are quite expensive.

Verna also reminded us that if someone is using a white stick with red stripes on the handle it means they are deaf as well as blind. And if you haven't noticed, books of stamps have two notches on the side for second class stamps and one notch for first class, a useful aid to a blind person choosing the correct stamp.

Chris our Bursary winner enjoyed a great course at Denmans in December on willow weaving, entitled "Decks the Halls with Willow". She learnt how to weave lots of decorations which made admirable presents for friends and relations.

Everyone agreed that it sounded like a good idea for a workshop later on in the year.





Opportunity to help restore Westonbirt Arborgtum's Grade 1 listed landscape

The Westonbirt Project and the Friends of Westonbirt Arboretum have sent us news regarding an interesting opportunity you may wish to take part in.

Public courses are being run this spring offering the chance to take part in the restoration and improvement of the Grade 1 listed landscape at Westonbirt Arboretum.

Friends, volunteers and visitors are invited to take part in the three day course, a first of its kind at Westonbirt, to help build a new Ha-ha stone wall boundary. This traditional form of stone and ironwork boundary has been used on the landscape since the arboretum's creation in the 1850s.

Led by a skilled eraftsperson, those on the course will help to ereate the stone façade of a new fla-ha from Down Gate. Robust, modern techniques completed by contractors will support the traditional stone façade. A course fee of £90 (10% discount is available for Friends of Westonbirt Arboretum members) will cover the cost of tools and instruction, whilst a grant from the 29th May 1961 Charity will cover contractors' costs for materials and groundworks.

In Psalm 90, after describing the shortness of life, Moses prayed, "Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom" (v.12).

To make the most of our earthly existence, we must lose ourselves in the will of God

(1 Peter 4:2). This we can do even when time is running out. It's never too late to give ourselves totally to God.



District Councillor Report

Good news for the Commons, the Higher Level Stewardship monies have been secured to help with the management of the Commons as from 1st April 2011. South Gloucestershire Council will be organising a meeting in the early Spring to look at the Stewardship requirements.

South Gloucestershire Council manages many Commons throughout the area, and recently has been considering proposals for a cricket pitch at Lydes Green Common, near Pucklechuch. This would be part of the developer's requirements for open space where around 2000 houses are to be built. As yet no decision has been made regarding this matter, but highlights the need for all to be engaged in the future management of Commons.

The Localism Bill has been published and will have a big impact on local government. The following are actions which central government will need to make in order to make these changes:

- Lift the burden of bureaucracy
- Empower communities to do things their way
- Increase local control of public finance
- Diversify the supply of public services
- Open up government to public scrutiny
- Strengthen accountability to local people

There appears to be little clarity on planning matters, with mention of Neighbourhood Planning with parish and town councils playing a bigger role. It is not clear who will be resourcing these plans.

As anticipated Regional Spatial Strategies are to be abolished. The Council has agreed its Core Planning Strategy; with changes currently out for consultation until the 8th February. Workshops are being held to consider the proposed developments in North Yate.

There are also to be changes in how the health service is delivered. In the future GP consortia will be responsible for commissioning the services. The local authorities will be responsible for public health and health improvement.

With these changes, it looks like Thornbury Hospital will loose its beds. Berkeley Hospital is to close, with a small unit being built in Dursley. I would be interested in hearing anyone's experiences at these hospitals.

Power and Voltage Failure. Several villages in the area suffered a power loss and a serious reduction in voltage recently with consequences on electrical equipment and boilers. Some residents are pursuing this with OfGem and Central Networks – if you would like to be involved and want to know more - perhaps you could contact me.


