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Murder in Iron Acton

The murder of 68-year-old grandfather Barry Rubery (above) at his Iron Acton home has shocked the community.

Police are committed to bringing those responsible for his death to justice.

A team of specialist officers is working on the case from a dedicated Major Crime Investigation Unit in Bristol, led by Detective Chief Inspector Garry Reeves, an experienced senior officer.

Local and national media – including the BBC Crimewatch programme – have run appeals for information.

Detectives have already spoken to hundreds of people and seized more than 500 exhibits, but they still need the help of you, the local community.

Did you see any activity around Crossing Cottage, Latteridge Road, on Wednesday April 28 between 8pm and midnight? Do you recognise the person in the artist's impression (above), who was seen in the area with a second man said to look like Eastenders' character Syed Masood?

Have you seen a shiny, dark-coloured pick-up with no back cover in the area?

Have you seen a dark-coloured long wheel-based Land Rover Defender twin cab with a hard or canvas-topped rear in the area?

Neighbourhood Inspector Deryck Rees said: "Overall crime in Iron Acton has fallen. It really is a very safe area, regularly patrolled by police teams based at Chipping Sodbury police station.

"Your neighbourhood team of PC Ian Matthews and Police Community Support Officers Andy Pound and Katie Radnedge have held extra beat surgeries and visited the village more frequently since this tragedy to offer support to the local community and the investigative team.

• Overall crime has fallen by 10 per cent compared with last year in the Frampton Cotterell neighbourhood area, which includes Iron Acton, Frampton Cotterell, Coalpit Heath and Westerleigh.

• There have only been two incidents of serious violent crime in the Frampton Cotterell neighbourhood area since 2008.

Neighbourhood teams have carried out speed checks in: Burton Road, Acton Turville; Station Road, Badminton; St Johns Way, Chipping Sodbury; France Lane, Hawkesbury; Latteridge Road, Iron Acton and Chedworth, Yate in response to priorities raised by local people.

Ten drivers have been given a verbal warning and three reported for speeding.



Vandals warned

Five boys arrested over criminal damage in Yate have been given final warnings.

The four 15-year-olds and a 14-year-old were arrested in April after damage to walls and fences in Highworth Crescent, Quedgeley, Sandhurst, St Briavels Drive and Toddington Close.

Neighbourhood PC Giles Sutton said: "This sort of mindless vandalism is simply unacceptable, and thankfully is not usual for the area, as tackling anti-social behaviour is a key priority for the team.

"The boys' parents support police action."

A final warning is only given to under-16s arrested for their first or second offence. Young people issued with a final warning are automatically referred to the Youth Offending Team for a programme to address their behaviour.

Drug grower jailed

A 37-year-old Westerleigh man was jailed for 12 months at Bristol Crown Court in June after police found 30 cannabis plants – with a potential street value of \pounds 30,000 – in a search of his home (above).

The neighbourhood team searched under the Misuse of Drugs Act in December.

Rogue traders get the cold shoulder

South Gloucestershire's first 'No Cold Calling Zones' were launched in Walton Heath and Ferndown in June in a bid to reduce doorstep crime.

The launch was part of a national day aimed at keeping people safe from doorstep crime.

The day saw police visiting builders and other trades people with South Gloucestershire Council Trading Standards officers to tell them about action taken against rogue traders.

Genuine traders support this action as rogue traders give them all a bad name.

Rogue trading includes over-charging and carrying out unnecessary or shoddy work.

Other doorstep crime includes bogus officials who talk their way into homes to steal, and bogus charity collectors.

Street signs and stickers on front doors identify No Cold Calling Zones.

Zone residents say 'no' to unwanted

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callers and report those ignoring the zone to trading standards or police.

Acting Neighbourhood Sergeant Neil Whyman said: "No Cold Calling Zones have proved effective in cutting doorstep crime in other areas. By working with the council and local people, we can stop these callous criminals.

"We know rogue trading is linked to other crime like distraction burglary. Both can be prevented by sticking to one simple rule: if you're unsure, don't open the door."

Councillor Heather Goddard, executive member for communities, said: "We work closely with police and Neighbourhood Watch to tackle doorstep crime."

Power for police

Neighbourhood police are working to protect vulnerable older people from doorstep crime with a series of initiatives.

Neighbourhood officers are committed to preventing local people from falling victim to distraction burglars and rogue traders.

Police, working with South Gloucestershire Council Trading Standards, will roll out more No Cold Calling Zones.

They are preparing special packs to be delivered to the most vulnerable householders, including advice leaflets, a creditcard sized magnifying glass, panic alarm, timer switch and door chain reminder stickers.

Neighbourhood teams will also be trained to deliver 'Elder Aware' talks to residents of sheltered housing schemes and other vulnerable groups.

Neighbourhood Inspector Deryck Rees said: "We don't have a lot of this sort of crime, but when it does happen it can really ruin people's quality of life.

"Often these rogues use the offer of maintenance work to get a foot in the door. If you have a frail relative, help them with the upkeep of their home, getting quotes from reputable traders.

"Deterring them is straightforward. Use your door viewer or window before letting anyone in and if you're unsure, don't open the door."

Police were out in force in June to mark the Relentless initiative's fifth anniversary.

The focus was 'keeping you safe', and officers were involved in a wide range of events from cycle-marking to improvements at crime victims' homes.

Assistant Chief Constable Anthony Bangham said: "This summer officers will be out and about in your community to address the issues that matter to you."

In the Chipping Sodbury, Yate and Villages area:

- Officers patrolled with Meals on Wheels.
- Thirty bicycles were marked by officers visiting Hawkesbury Upton School in a crime prevention initiative.
- Officers and crossing patrol staff kept children at schools across Yate safe,

Policing trials

Police helped ensure one of the world's largest equestrian events went well.

Around 100,000 people visited Badminton Horse Trials. The police priority was to ensure visitors arrive safely with minimum disruption to local people.

Neighbourhood PC Mike Hart said: "Badminton Horse Trials is a well-planned and problem-free event. We work with the organisers and others to keep it that way."

Police patrol the site as a reassuring presence just in case of emergency and offer rural crime prevention advice to locals.

There were no policing issues at the main event, but police are investigating an assault on a 25-year-old woman early on Monday May 3.
