### TROPHY PROFILE:

### The Leslie Wicks Memorial Cup for Best Begonia in Show (Class 326)

Leslie was born in Old Sodbury in 1923. He was called into the Army at the age of 19, and when demobbed 5 years later, he returned to Old Sodbury. In 1950 he married Blanche and they moved to Petty France. The previous tenants of their cottage were both in their 80s and so there was plenty to do in the garden. He purchased a greenhouse and two dozen begonia corms. He was so pleased with his first entry at Hawkesbury Show, he continued showing begonias until 1993, when through illness, he was unable to carry on.

He died in 1994, and left four greenhouses and over 100 begonias in bloom.

### RECIPES FOR CLASSES 413 & 414

### Fruit cake (Class 413)

8oz (225g) self-raising flour4 tablespoons milk9oz (250g) mixed dried fruit½ teaspoon salt4 oz (110g) caster sugar2 eggs4oz (110g) butter or margarine

Rub fat into flour. Add the sugar and salt. Stir in the beaten eggs and milk. Mix well. Add the fruit. Bake in a lined, 18cm diameter round cake tin for 1¼ hours on the middle shelf at 325°F/160°C/Mark 3.

### Madeira cake (Class 414)

6 oz (175g) butter or margarine 4oz (110g) plain flour 5 oz (150g) self-raising flour Citron peel (optional)

3 large eggs 6oz (175g) caster sugar Grated rind and juice of ½ lemon (optional)

Grease and baseline an 18cm diameter round cake tin.

Beat the fat and sugar until light and fluffy.

Beat the eggs then add to the mixture a little at a time, beating well after each addition. Fold in the sifted flours gently. Stir in the lemon juice and rind if using. Spoon the mixture into the tin and level the surface.

Bake in the centre of a pre-heated over 235°F/160°C/Mark 3 for 1 ¼ hours. After half an hour, put the citron peel across the cake and continue to cook. Leave to cool in tin for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack.

### CARNIVAL CLASSES (OPEN) Carnival Rules

- CARNIVAL CLASS ENTRIES SHOULD BE MADE IN ADVANCE ON THE ENTRY FORM. Entry fee is 25p for classes 1-8 and class 10 (irrespective of the number of persons taking part in the entry). Entry fee for class 9 is £1.
- 2) Trailers and large floats should arrive by 1pm and park in Hunters Mead.
- 3) Judges will make an initial inspection of the classes at The Plain and make their final decision in the arena. Merit will be given for originality, amount of work involved and presentation. The judges reserve the right to refrain from judging any entry they consider inappropriate or openly political.
- 4) Prizes for all classes and awards for the Carnival Queen and her Attendants will be made in the arena.
- 5) All carnival entrants will be granted FREE ENTRY to the showground after the procession. Hands will be stamped on The Plain between 1.10pm and 1.30pm. Friends and family walking with carnival entrants please pay to enter the Showground as normal.
- 6) Prize money will be as follows:

### HAWKESBURY TOP TRAY COMPETITION

CLASS 2014 (Open to all)

The Hawkesbury Top Tray class is for a collection of <u>three types of</u> <u>vegetables</u> taken from the following list, the quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets: carrots (3), cauliflowers (2), onions (3), parsnips (3), peas (6 pods), potatoes (3), runner beans (6 pods), tomatoes (6), French Beans (6 pods), sweet corn (2), pepper (3), cucumber (2), courgettes (3), red beet (3), aubergines (2).

Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points - split into three sections –

- 7 points for size, shape and colour
- 7 points for condition
- 6 points for uniformity The overall mark will be out of a total of 60.

A tray or board measuring 45cm by 60cm (18x24in), internal measurements, can be used to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked on the staging. The vegetables must be displayed completely within this area, without bending any part of them or overlapping any part of the area.

A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing, but no other foliage or accessories are allowed.

#### NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- 1) Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 7.5cm (3in).
- 2) Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.
- 3) Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.
- 4) Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case).
- 5) Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc to check for quality.
- 6) The tray, board or staging must not be cut in any way at all such as holes for standing onions in.
- 7) Points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards.
- 8) Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the show officials.

### HAWKESBURY TOP VASE COMPETITION

#### CLASS 2014 (Open to all)

The Hawkesbury Top Vase class is for a **vase of mixed flowering stems** containing a total of between 5 and 10, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants. Please note that it is two different KINDS of plants; two varieties of the same plant are NOT two kinds.

The display is judged out of a total of 35 points, split into:

- 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display.
- 10 points for the overall presentation and effect of the flowers in the vase.

Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only; no seed heads or berries will be allowed. No marks will be awarded for the vase itself. Additional foliage is not allowed unless it is foliage growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to that stem is. Packing material, such as florists' foam, is allowed to keep the stems in place.

#### NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera. For instance, pinks, carnations and sweet william - which are all dianthus would not be classed as different kinds.
- 2) Use only fresh, homegrown flowers. No dried or silk flowers allowed.
- 3) The Hawkesbury Top Vase class is open for anyone to enter.
- 4) Please note that the display should be viewed all round.
- 5) The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards.
- 6) Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the show officials.

### HAWKESBURY HORTICULTURAL SHOW RULES

- 1) The marquee will be open on the morning of the Show for the reception of articles for exhibition from 6.30am until 9.45am. The marquee will then be closed to the public and nothing further admitted. A bell will ring at 9.30am and at 9.45am to signal 15 minutes and 5 minutes before the marquee is closed to exhibitors.
- 2) Exhibitors may enter no more than TWO exhibits per class but may take only ONE prize position
- 3) All vegetables, fruit and flowers exhibited must be grown by the competitor. Crafts should be the work of those exhibiting them. For classes 447 450, 538 540, all the photographs must have been taken by the entrant. Any breach of these rules, whether discovered at the time or after the Show, will disqualify the entrant from receiving any prize at any future Show of the Society. The Entries Secretary is empowered to refuse any entry that is not considered in accordance with the rules.
- 4) There will be a fee of 25p for every entry (adults and children). There will be a maximum entry fee of £10 for any one individual (not family) entering more than 50 exhibits. No entry fee is charged for entries submitted by Hawkesbury Primary School and Pre-School (i.e. classes 501 516)
- 5) Entries for Carnival Classes should be made on the official entry form and submitted, with correct entry fee, as above. Late entries for Carnival Classes will be taken on Show Day from **1.00pm - 1.15pm** on The Plain. The decision of the judges is not to be disputed. Quality and originality will be considered in all classes.

- 7) Any complaint concerning any entry in any class may be lodged only by a competitor or a steward to the Chairman or Entries Secretary by 4pm on the day of the Show. At their discretion, an immediate inspection of the competitor's garden can be carried out by three members of the Committee, whose findings shall be considered final.
- 8) Exhibits may be submitted for the classes in Sections 1, 2 and 3 by both Cottagers (who live within the parishes of Hawkesbury and Hillesley) and Open entrants (who live anywhere). Cottagers may put in up to two entries in each class in both Cottagers and Open categories if desired. All entries must be marked either C or O on the entry form to indicate the kind of entry required.
- 9) All children may enter Section 5, but only those who live within these parishes or attending Hawkesbury Primary School may compete for trophies. For Section 5, the qualifying age is at 1<sup>st</sup> September 2013.
- 10) Exhibits may not be removed before 6pm without the Entries Secretary's consent.
- 11) When a number of distinct colours are required, white may be counted.
- 12) Entrants must not move other entrants' exhibits. If there is not enough space for an entrant's exhibit, a marquee steward should be contacted. Failure to comply may result in disqualification.
